In preparation for our anniversary celebrations in 2024 and 2025, it was decided that we needed to clean out and tidy up our facility, especially since many visitors would be joining us to celebrate. In order to "clean house,"

we needed a plan—what to keep, give away, discard. The result of this discussion was for us to not only clean the church, but to ask our members to do the same, spring clean their homes and donate their unwanted/unused items to the church for a congregation-wide yard sale! As we contemplated the enormity of this undertaking it became clear that it would take great organizational skills and experience with yard sales, and someone to lead the charge; Phyllis Cousineau and Carol Zimmerman filled the bill as leaders, with Linda Greene, Judy O'Dell and myself as the cheerleaders/workers.

Members cooperated by dropping off their donations, and on Sunday, June 16 the process of setting up began. Jim Lindsey worked to bring items from the basement to the fellowship hall, and a cadre of members took down chairs and installed/arranged tables. By Monday we were ready to begin pricing, placing and creating order out of the chaos, and this process continued right up to the Thursday evening open house for members. We opened our doors to the public on Friday at 9 a.m., and a steady stream of customers purchased more than \$1600.00 worth of goods.

Stories to share: Phyllis had a conversation with a navy veteran who was delighted to share his stories of serving in the same arena in which her father had served. It was so interesting to listen to his stories. A young man who taught piano to underprivileged kids in Kalamazoo played ragtime on the Keyboard Gunder donated; we were happy to sell it to him for next to nothing, since he was paying it forward to one of the kids who didn't have a way to practice.

A Dad came in on Friday and looked over the old drum set that we had hauled out of the basement and Ed Mallett set up for us. He said he would be back on Saturday after he and his son thought about it. Dad played drums and son wanted to learn, and Dad knew how to fix the broken snare drum stand. We had halved the price just prior to their arrival and they were delighted to be able to afford it.

Many customers had never been to Immanuel, and were in awe of our baptismal font and the loveliness of the facility. Of course we invited them back.

The Yard Sale Team wants to thank all of you who contributed, and helped in other ways. Of course there were lessons learned, the gals who worked every day were really tuckered out! And thank you to Steve and Nedra for assisting with boxing things up and returning chairs in the fellowship hall.

Carol Zimmerman took a carload of leftovers to her yard sale to see if she would have any better luck with a different set of buyers. We will report a final dollar amount within a week or so. Habitat for Humanity sent its truck on Tuesday morning, and left with everything in tip top shape!

The Bible verse from Micah 6:8 reads "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

Health news for July includes:

- 1. According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control) in 2022 the ten leading causes of death are 1) heart disease (702,880), 2) cancer (608,371), 3) accidents (227,039), 4) COVID-19 (186,552), 5) stroke (165,393), 6) chronic lower respiratory diseases (147,382), 7) Alzheimer's disease (120,122), 8) Diabetes (101,209), 9) Nephritis, nephrotic syndrome, & nephrosis (57,937), 10) Chronic liver disease & cirrhosis (54,803). Life expectancy in 2022 = 77.5 years.
- 2. In 2022 the number of US births was 3,661,220 or 56.1 births per 1000 women aged 15 -44 years. The highest rate of births occurred during morning and midday hours. Births on Saturday and Sunday were more likely to occur in late evening and early morning hours than births Monday through Friday.
- 3. July is Myasthenia Gravis (MG) Awareness Month. MG is either an autoimmune or congenital neuromuscular disease which leads to fluctuating muscle weakness and fatigue. Muscle weakness is noticed shortly after birth, as the baby has poor sucking instincts. Treatment may include medications, removal of the thymus gland and plasma exchange.
- 4. July is National Juvenile Arthritis (JA) Awareness Month. JA is any form of arthritis or arthritis related condition present in children under 16 years old. JA is a chronic autoimmune disease affecting about 220,000 children and teens in the US; the most common type is juvenile rheumatic arthritis. In most cases JA is caused by the body attacking its own health cells and tissues which causes the joints to become inflamed and stiff.
